PSAT-Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test

The State of Georgia pays for all tenth graders to take the PSAT. However, we strongly encourage all ninth grade students that are considering attending college to take the PSAT their freshman year. The cost is only \$13 and the student pays the school so that he/she can be registered to take the test with the sophomore class. The test will be given on Wednesday, October 15, 2008, during the school day. Students can use the PSAT results to identify weak areas for practice before taking the SAT during the junior year. The school also uses the PSAT data to identify Advanced Placement courses that need to be offered to our student body. The AP Potential program can let us know exactly which students may do well in a particular AP class the following school term.

STUDENT BEHAVIORAL EXPECTATIONS AND CONSEQUENCES ARE LISTED IN THE 2008-2009 COLUMBIA COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL CODE OF CONDUCT. THE RULES AND PROCEDURES IN THIS STUDENT HANDBOOK ARE LISTED SIMPLY AS AN ADDITION TO THE CODE OF CONDUCT.

ATTENDANCE POLICY/ATTENDANCE PROCEDURE

It is the philosophy of Lakeside High School that when a student reaches his/her sixteenth birthday, the student is attending school because he/she wants to rather than because he/she is required to attend by law. Regular attendance and compliance with the rules and regulations set forth by the County Board of Education are expected of all students. Failure to comply with these rules will result in that student forfeiting his/her privilege to attend Lakeside.

Columbia County Board of Education
Student Attendance Protocol

A Student Attendance Protocol Committee was established by the Chief Judge of the Superior Court of the Columbia County Jurisdiction for the purpose of ensuring coordination and cooperation among officials, agencies and programs involved in compulsory attendance issues; to improve student achievement by reducing student absences from school; and to ensure compliance with the percentage of students participating in required standardized tests and other attendance requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act. The attendance committee set forth the following protocol to be used in identifying, reporting, investigating and prosecuting cases of alleged violations of O.C.G.A. 20-2-690.1, relating to mandatory school attendance and appropriately addressing the issues with parents and guardians. The attendance committee voted unanimously on May 19, 2005 to accept the following protocol and to establish policy for the Columbia County Board of Education.

Truancy

The Columbia County Board of Education adopts, as a part of the student codes of conduct developed pursuant to O.C.G.A. 20-2-735, a definition of truancy that contains the minimum standards related to student attendance and a summary of possible consequences and penalties for truancy established in state board rule (160-5- 1-.10).

Truant

For the purpose of this protocol a student may be considered truant during any semester upon the accumulation of three unexcused absences or a total of seven absences without required documentation.

Referral to the Legal Authority

Upon the student's third unexcused absence per semester or the student's seventh total absence per semester, without the required documentation, the student and the parent shall be referred by the school to the appropriate legal authority having jurisdiction. The parent or student may face penalties including a fine, loss of custody of the student, or incarceration for each day missed.

Upon the student's tenth absence per semester, regardless of the reasons for the absences, a student may be referred to the legal authorities for further investigation. The penalties described above may be applicable.

Parental Notification

The school will notify the parent or guardian when a student is in jeopardy of becoming truant as defined by this policy. Parents will also be notified that subsequent absences will be referred to the system social worker and the appropriate legal authority. Any parent, guardian, or other person residing in this state who has control or charge of a child or children and who shall violate the Truancy Code, O.C.G.A. 20-2-690.1, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine not less than \$25 and not greater than \$100, imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, community service, or any combination of such penalties, at the discretion of the court having jurisdiction.

Notification by Certified Mail

After two reasonable attempts to notify the parent, guardian or other person who has charge of the student, the Columbia County School System will send written notice via certified mail with return receipt requested.

The Columbia County School System requires that all its public schools provide the parent, guardian, or other person having control or charge of each student enrolled in public school a written summary of possible consequences and penalties for failing to comply with compulsory attendance.

Statement of Receipt

By September 1 of each school year or within 30 school days of a student's enrollment in the Columbia County School System, the parent, guardian, or other person having control or charge of such student must sign a statement indicating receipt of such written statement of possible consequences and penalties.

In addition, students age ten or older by September 1 must sign a statement indicating receipt of written statement of possible consequences for non-compliance to the local system's policy.

Drivers License Denial

The Columbia County Board of Education requires the local school superintendent or the superintendent's designee to use his or her best efforts, including certified mail, to notify students age 14 and older when the student has only three absences remaining before violating the state's attendance requirements pursuant to O.C.G.A. 40-5-2 regarding the denial of driver's permits and licenses.

Excused Absences

A student may be excused for the following reasons:

1. Personal illness
2. Serious illness or death of an immediate family member (Immediate family includes parents or legal guardians, grandparents, siblings, and stepfamily)
3. Special and recognized religious holidays recognized by their faith
4. Mandated order of government agencies
5. Registration to vote (limited to one day)
6. Emergencies which reasonably necessitate absences from school
7. Special events which reasonably necessitate absences from school
8. Service as Pages in the General Assembly of the State of Georgia (Students serving in this capacity must gain school approval at least one week in advance of the absence)
9. Days missed from school to visit with his or her parent or legal guardian prior to deployment to or during leave from an overseas assignment to a combat zone or combat support posting, up to a maximum of 5 school days per school year.

In the case that a student's personal illness or attendance in school endangers the student's health or the health of others, the Columbia County Board of Education requires the student to present required documentation upon return to school for the purpose of validating the absence as excused. The school will allow up to five absences with medical excuses per semester on the authority of written parent notes. Following five absences for illness per semester excused by notes written by the parent or guardian, additional absences will be excused only with an original medical excuse signed by a health care professional. Parents must retain copies of all documentation of excuses for the duration of the school year and must present them to the applicable agency or Court upon request. Parents or students who claim that the absence is properly excused bear the burden of providing copies of the medical excuses and/or other documentation of excuses, which may be demanded to be reviewed at any time. With proper verification, a student may be eligible for hospital/homebound instruction (S.B.O.E. Rule 160-4-2-.31). Additionally, certain acute health conditions of the student may warrant a Health Care Plan coordinated by the school nurse, in concert with the student's parent and attending physician, whereby provisions can be made relative to medically based absences for the student beyond those set forth in this protocol.

In the event of a serious illness in a student's immediate family, local boards will require students to present appropriate medical documentation regarding the family member upon return to school for the purpose of validating that the absence is an excused absence. School days missed as a result of an out-of-school suspension shall not count as unexcused days for the purpose of determining student truancy.

Grades and Absences

All excuses are required within two school days of the student's return to school; otherwise, the absence will be considered unexcused and make-up opportunity will not be afforded to high school students; however, an opportunity to make-up major tests and projects shall be afforded. All documentation for excusing an absence must specify the particular day missed.

When absences are excused, students shall be afforded the opportunity to make up all work. It will be the student's responsibility to attend to make-up work promptly upon return to school and to complete all assignments within a reasonable time. Students who have emergencies necessitating their absence from school for a portion of the school day must have been present for the majority of the school day to be counted present. Schools shall establish incentives and rewards to enhance student attendance.

Absences due to short-term (out-of-school) suspension or pending a disciplinary hearing are unexcused and make up of class work shall not be afforded; however, an opportunity to make up major exams and special projects shall be afforded, provided the suspension is imposed by the school and is not the choice of the student.

Absences shall not penalize student's grades provided the following conditions are met:

- (1) Absences are justified and validated for excusable reasons;
- (2) Make-up work for excused absences was completed satisfactorily;
- (3) A grade average of 70 or above has been earned in the course work.

Extra-Curricular Activities

The school shall not allow a student to participate in any extra-curricular activities, co-curricular activities, or cooperative work experience if the student was not counted present for the school day. Students who have been deemed truant by the auspices of this policy shall lose eligibility for participation in extra-curricular activities for the remainder of the semester.

Parking

Students who have more than five absences may lose their right to park on school campuses. The denial of parking privileges will be determined by the principal.

Prior Approvals

Prior to the implementation of this attendance protocol, students were permitted excused absences for reasons not included on page one of this policy. This practice, known as prior approval, will no longer be in effect. Items #6 and #7 of the Excused Absences Section provide for the excuse of absences due to emergencies and special events not covered in this policy. Special event absences must be presented to and approved by the school principal prior to the absence.

POLICY CONCERNING MAKE-UP WORK

All tests and graded assignments that are missed because of an excused absence must be made up at the teacher's discretion. The suggested schedule is as follows:

Monday	Science and Social Studies
Tuesday	English and Foreign Language
Wednesday	Math and Vocational/Business Education
Thursday	Physical Education and Fine Arts

It is recommended that the student keep up with classroom and homework assignments when absent from school. Students should have a classmate to contact for assignments.

Students who know that they must be absent for at least three days (includes hospitalization, death in the family, etc.) should request advance assignments whenever possible. Parents may contact the front office to request class assignments. Please allow the school twenty-four hours to gather these assignments so that the teachers may have adequate time to prepare them. Full cooperation with these guidelines will assist the student in making appropriate plans to avoid getting behind in class work due to excusable absences from school.

PROCEDURE FOR SIGNING IN/OUT OF SCHOOL

Students who check in late or check out early must sign in/out at the Attendance window. No student is permitted to arrive/ leave the school at any time during the school day without a permit from the office and verified permission from a parent or guardian. The student will be charged with an unexcused absence and will face Out of School Suspension or In-School Suspension. Also, driving privileges will be revoked for the remainder of the semester or four weeks-whichever is longer.

Students who plan to sign out early due to dental and doctor appointments, for example, must bring a note from their parents or guardian. The note should include a parent's or guardian's telephone number for verification. Students should bring these notes to the attendance office before school and must sign out at the attendance window before leaving. Failure to sign in/out will result in ISS. When the student returns to school, he/she must bring documentation from the doctor or dentist's office to verify the appointment and he/she will receive an admittance slip. The admittance slip must be presented to all teachers whose classes were missed.

Students will not be allowed to use the office phone to call a parent to get permission to leave school early. Students who are ill are to report to the attendance office.

TARDY POLICY

Every teacher will record individual student tardies to each class for every period of the day. This includes tardies to school (first period) and tardies to all classes. Students must obtain a tardy slip from the attendance window in order to be admitted to class when signing in after first period. The disposition of tardies will be as follows:

Tardies 1 and 2-written referral signed by the student

Tardies 3, 4, and 5-written referral and one hour detention

6 or more tardies – In-School Suspension

The only exception to this rule will be tardies caused by verified doctor's appointments supported by documentation from the physician or dentist's office or by a mandatory court appearance supported by court documentation. NOTE: Parental notes/excuses will allow the student to make up any missed work; however, the tardy will still count! If you are late, you are late!

Driving to school is an option; it is not a requirement. Tardiness caused by traffic or car trouble will be unexcused. Students who drive to school must accept the responsibility of leaving home early enough to be in first period when the tardy bell rings.

EXAM EXEMPTION POLICY

Semester exams are required of students in grades nine through twelve. Students in grades nine (9), ten (10), and eleven (11) with a course grade average of eighty (80) or above and with no absences from class; with a course average of eighty-five (85) or above and with no more than three absences from class; or with a course average of ninety (90) or above and with no more than five (5) absences, excused or prior approval, from class, and no disciplinary referrals that resulted in out-of-school suspension or in-school suspension may exempt a maximum of two (2) final examinations per semester. Students who meet the exemption criteria in more than two courses may choose the two examinations to be exempted. Students who meet the criteria for the first semester may not exempt a final exam in the same content area for the second semester.

Students in grade twelve (12) with a course average of eighty (80) or above and no absences from class, excused or prior approval, and no disciplinary referrals that resulted in out-of-school expulsion or in-school suspension, may exempt a maximum of two (2) final examinations per semester.

Students in grade twelve (12) with a course average of eighty-five (85) or above and with no more than three absences from class, excused or prior approval, and no disciplinary referrals that resulted in out-of-school suspension or in-school suspension may exempt a maximum of three (3) final examinations per semester.

Students in grade twelve (12) with a course grade average of ninety (90) or above and with no more than five (5) absences, excused or prior approval, from class, and no disciplinary referrals that resulted in out-of-school suspension or in-school suspension may exempt all qualifying course examinations both semesters.

A senior who is a candidate for graduation and in the final semester must be allowed to take two retests of the final exam if needed for graduation. Students will not be allowed to retake an examination unless a sufficient score will enable the student to pass the course. If the student is still failing after these two retests, the student must retake the course. However, seniors will not be allowed to retake the exam for any course that has an End-of-the-Course Test (EOCT).

Absences for two prior approved visits per semester to post-secondary institutions shall be excused and shall not count against exam exemption in this policy provided that the absence was pre-approved by the principal. Absences for these visits may not total more than six days for the three-semester period of time. This would apply to students during the last semester of the junior year and the first and second semesters of their senior year.

Absences for one prior approved absence during the senior year for activities connected to the senior project shall be excused and shall not count against exam exemption in this policy provided that the absence was pre-approved by the principal and/or senior project coordinator. The student shall submit proof of presence at the activity including a contact telephone number. This would enable the student to make up any work he or she may have missed while absent.

Absences due to the death of an immediate family member may be waived by the superintendent of schools. Immediate family is defined as

father, mother, brother, sister, child, grandfather, grandmother or spouse of the student concerned or relative living in the residence of the student. Documentation should be attached to the student's request for a waiver (capped at three days per semester).

Absences due to attending religious services on high holy days held during the school day (capped at two days per semester) may be granted an exception to the exam exemption policy. However, appropriate documentation must be provided including a prior approval form.

Students wishing to file an exam exemption appeal must do so within five days of returning to school after the absence. Students that wait until the end of the semester to file an exam appeal will not be allowed to exempt. Courses that include an End of Course Test cannot be exempted for any reason.

GRADUATION POLICY

All students participating in the graduation ceremony must have completed all requirements for graduation. These requirements include the completion of a program of study with the appropriate Carnegie units, the passing of all sections of the Georgia High School Graduation Test, and meeting any attendance requirements that are stated.

Students that satisfactorily complete the requirements for a program of study but fail a portion of the Georgia High School Graduation Test will not receive a diploma at graduation. In this situation, the student would be offered the choice to participate in the ceremony and receive a certificate of attendance or not participate in the ceremony at all. If the student chooses to participate, his/her name will have a notation in the graduation program indicating acceptance of a certificate of attendance.

GRADUATION CEREMONY

Due to the obvious importance of this once in a lifetime event, we will be expecting our seniors to behave in a mature and dignified manner. Any of the following actions will be considered inappropriate:

- Wearing improper graduation attire (see dress code below)
- Making rude or unacceptable comments or noises during the ceremony
- Participating in rude behavior such as passing around or hitting inflatable beach balls, etc.
- Doing anything unusual while on stage receiving diploma cover (skipping, dancing, etc.)

GRADUATION HONOR CORDS

There will be four Honor Cords allowed to be worn for graduation:

1. Honor Student (Overall average of 90 or above)
2. Fine Arts Honor Society Cord (Tri-M, Art, Thespian)
3. Foreign Language Honor Society Cord (French, Spanish, & Latin)
4. Academic Honor Society Cord (Mu Alpha Theta, Beta Club, National Honor Society, National Technical Honor Society)

Clubs or groups that qualify under one of the categories above must be affiliated with a nationally recognized Honor Society. To be considered for a cord, the organization officers and sponsor must file a written request to the Graduation Committee along with the necessary documentation. The final decision rests with the Graduation Committee and cannot be appealed.

Regional/State College and Universities strongly recommend electives from the Core-Areas of English/Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, and Modern (foreign) Languages.

ACADEMIC HONORS

Academic Letters

Academic letters are to be awarded annually on the previous year's work. Letters are to be awarded to the pupils in the senior high school (grades 9-12) who earn an annual grade of not less than 90 in each subject and in department. Credits to be counted are those that are earned toward graduation requirements. **Credit awarded in the middle school (i.e. Algebra, Spanish credit) will not be used in the academic letter criteria.**

High School Honor Graduates, Valedictorian and Salutatorian

Honor graduates from Columbia County Schools are to be selected at the conclusion of the third nine-week grading period of the students' senior year. The valedictorian and the salutatorian must have been enrolled in a Columbia County School for two complete years of the four high school years. (Grades for students participating in the post-secondary options program would be calculated as outlined in that policy and procedure.) For a student to be considered for valedictorian or salutatorian, the student must have received numerical grades for four years of study from accredited schools, not including home schools or schools lacking full accreditation. For the purpose of selecting honor graduates, excluding valedictorian and salutatorian, courses transferred into Columbia County Schools from non-accredited schools and from approved home schools shall be validated by comprehensive course examinations. The student and parent may elect to receive a "p" if the grade on the exam was 70 or above or a "u" if the grade was 69 or below if the student does not elect to be considered for any honors recognition program. The student and parent must elect to receive the grade on the comprehensive course examination as the validated grade for the course if the student elects to be considered for any honors recognition program including, but not limited to, the selection of honor graduates. Courses for which the Columbia County Schools does not have a comprehensive examination will be considered elective courses and will not be assigned a numerical grade that would be used to calculate the student's average. No grade transferred into the system may be higher than the average attained in the Columbia County School System. For the purpose of selecting honor graduates including salutatorian and valedictorian, **grades will end at the third-nine weeks of the senior year.**

Beginning with the class of 2009, in determining who shall be valedictorian and salutatorian, the principal shall use the following **criteria**:

- 1. Beginning with the graduating class of 2009, all graduates maintaining a four-year cumulative average of ninety (90) or above will be declared Honor Graduates.**
- 2.** For consideration for Valedictorian or Salutatorian, a student must have taken a minimum of three (3) Advanced Placement courses. (If three Advanced Placement courses were not available during a student's tenure at a high school, the principal may reduce the three (3) course minimum to the number that was offered at that school). AP courses will still maintain a .05 weighting which is included in the final nine weeks average.
- 3.** The student with the highest overall four-year **cumulative numerical** average will be named valedictorian.

4. The student with the second overall four-year **cumulative numerical** average will be named salutatorian.
5. If two or more students have identical highest four-year **cumulative** numerical averages calculated to four decimal places, the students will be named co-valedictorians and no salutatorian will be named for that year.
6. If there are scholarships for the valedictorian, the co-valedictorians meeting the scholarship criteria will divide the scholarship funding, if this is allowed. If there is one valedictorian and if two or more students have identical second highest four-year **cumulative** numerical averages calculated to four decimal places, the students will be named co-salutatorians. If there are scholarships for the salutatorian, the co-salutatorians meeting the scholarship criteria will divide the scholarship funding, if this is allowed.

TELEPHONES/CELL PHONES/MP3 PLAYERS/IPODS

Students shall not possess unauthorized electronic devices expressly prohibited by school authorities. Students shall not have cellular phones, MP3 players, IPods, etc. out, on, or in use during the school day. The school is not responsible for confiscated items. These items should not be at school to begin with.

Disposition: Violators will be subject to the following disciplinary actions:

- First Offense: Detention. Phone will be held until retrieved by the students parent.
- Second Offense: Suspension. Phone will be returned following a parent conference
- Third Offense: Principal's discretion up to recommendation for long-term suspension or expulsion; item(s) will be confiscated and returned at principal's discretion.

LUNCHROOM

We do not have an "open campus" policy for lunch. Students should remain in school during his/her lunch period unless a parent signs them out for situations/circumstances that cannot be handled after school hours. Students must remain in the Commons Area. Students may not go to the gym or outside during their lunch period.

The cafeteria should be neat and clean at all times. Students should return their lunch trays to the proper area and dispose of paper in proper containers. Students are asked to leave the cafeteria, as they would like to find it. Anyone violating the cafeteria rules will face disciplinary action.

1. **Students caught throwing ANY object in the lunchroom will serve a minimum of one day of In-School Suspension.**
2. **Students not returning their tray to the window or leaving their table dirty will be assigned one day of In-School Suspension.**
3. Students that are excessively loud or yell during lunch will be assigned a minimum of one day of In-School Suspension.
4. Students are to place backpacks behind the wooden barriers near each lunch line to prevent tripping hazards.

5. Students are not allowed to cut in line or ask someone else to buy food/drink in lieu of cutting. Minimum punishment will be three hours of detention.
6. **Fast Food of any kind is not allowed in the lunchroom under any circumstances.**
7. Tea is for faculty members and lunchroom employees only.
8. Students may purchase one (1) lunch at student price. A second lunch will be sold at the adult price.
9. Students are requested to bring the correct change so that the lines move faster.
10. Lunch will be served during the first thirty minutes of each lunch period. Students are asked to return trays immediately after they have finished eating. All tables must be cleaned of trays and plates ten minutes before the end of the period. Any student that is asked by an adult to clean up a table is expected to do so. Failure to comply with this request will be considered willful refusal and will result in suspension from school.
11. Students must remain in the cafeteria and will not be allowed to enter the classroom corridors during their lunch period.
12. Students can put money on their account before school by visiting the cafeteria manager.

MEDIA CENTER

1. Students may check out up to five books for a two week period. A student I.D. is necessary for checking out books. Any materials that are taken from the media center without being checked out will be considered stolen property.
2. Reference books and current periodicals are to be used in the media center.
3. Fines for overdue books are \$.10 per day for regular items and \$1.00 for overnight items.
4. Lost or damaged items are the responsibility of the borrower. There will be a \$1.00 service charge on all lost property plus accrued fines.
5. Students with overdue books or fines will not be able to check out additional materials until overdue items are returned and all fines and charges are cleared.
6. **NOTE:** Students will not receive report cards until all school books and materials, including library books and uniforms, are returned. Also, all lost or damage fines must be paid.
7. Students must bring their pass books signed by the classroom teacher in order to use the media center during the school day, except during a student's lunch period.
8. An atmosphere conducive to individual study will be maintained at all times. During lunch periods, classes accompanied by teachers will have priority; then, if room allows, individual students will also be admitted.
9. Book bags are not permitted in the media center. We strongly recommend that students secure valuables in their assigned lockers before coming into the media center.
10. No chewing gum, food or drinks are allowed in the media center.
11. In order to use the Internet, all students must return a "Parent or Guardian Network Responsibility Contract" to their homeroom teacher.

When using the Internet in the media center, students must display their student I.D. cards which will indicate Internet permission status.

12. Our computer stations are provided for research purposes only. Therefore, we do not allow them to be used for surfing, games, e-mail, or chat rooms. Failure to abide by this rule may result in loss of all Internet privileges. Students that access restricted sites (such as MySpace.com) will be assigned two days of In-School Suspension.

ASSEMBLIES/PEP RALLIES

Students are expected to be on their best behavior during assemblies, pep rallies, or any other gathering with a guest speaker. If you attend a special program, you are expected to participate fully in all activities.

1. All students are to report to the gym with their appropriate grade level and sit in their assigned section. Please enter through the gym doors from the commons.
2. All students must remain in the bleachers during the pep rally. The only students to be on the gym floor are the cheerleaders and the pep rally participants.
3. There is to be absolutely no pushing or shoving.
4. No items are to be brought into the gym, including but not limited to streamers, noisemakers, etc.
5. When someone is at the microphone, please show them respect and listen to what is being said.
6. Students are to stand and show the appropriate respect during the Alma Mater, National Anthem, and Pledge.

Students violating these rules will receive three hours of detention to suspension and may be denied access to future pep rallies/assemblies. A second offense will result in the loss of the privilege to participate in such functions for the remainder of the year.

HALLS AND HALL PASSES

Respect and courtesy to other students and to teachers should be exercised in halls. Running, shoving and pushing are not permissible. Students are expected to keep hallways free of litter and should report to their next class immediately after leaving their previous room or locker. Traffic should stay to the right to minimize congestion, especially during class changes.

Students must have the student handbook, initialed by the teacher, with date, time, and destination noted, when they leave the classroom for any reason.

Students leaving early during the school day may not loiter around the campus. When a student's last class is over, he/she must leave the campus or have a hall pass to see a teacher, counselor, administrator or to use the Media Center.

STUDENT PARKING

1. Students who drive cars to and from school must have a valid driver's license and vehicle liability insurance. All vehicles must be registered with School Safety in order to receive a LHS Parking Permit.
2. Students must purchase a regular student permit or a senior parking permit at the cost of \$20.00. Parking fees will be used to maintain parking lots and to purchase security-oriented items such as video cameras.
3. After the car is parked, students are required to report to the commons area immediately. There will be no sitting in automobiles at any time. Students are not permitted in the parking lot during school hours without direct permission from Public Safety or the Administration.
4. Parking spots are numbered and will be assigned to each driver. Students that leave campus without permission will lose parking privileges for the remainder of the semester or four weeks-whichever is longer.
5. All students are urged to lock their vehicles. Also, unsecured valuable items should be left at home or placed out of sight inside the vehicle or trunk compartment. Vehicles are parked on campus at your own risk. The school is not responsible for any losses or vandalism.
6. Reporting information: In order to provide a safe and secure parking lot, students should immediately report any suspicious activity or persons in the parking lot to the Public Safety Officer. Also, vehicle accidents should immediately be reported to Public_Safety prior to moving any vehicles.
7. Students with 5 unexcused absences will lose their parking permit for the remainder of the semester.
8. Students who park out of zone or drive inappropriately will face disciplinary action or fines:
 - a. Parking without a permit - 2 hours detention
 - b. Parking in any space that is not assigned to you will result in two (2) hours detention for the first offense. Subsequent offenses will result in loss of driving privileges.
 - c. Parking in a handicapped zone without authorization - 3 hours detention
 - d. Vehicle driving offenses - 1 hour detention to 2 days of suspension

NOTE: The Administration reserves the right to tow any vehicle that is illegally parked without prior warning and to revoke parking and driving privileges on campus if such need arises.

The privilege of parking on the school campus is extended for granting consent to the school administration to search the vehicle without warning when there is reason to believe there are inappropriate items in the vehicle. The school assumes no liability for vehicles on campus.

ATHLETICS

Lakeside fields teams in the following sports: Football, Cheerleading, Swimming/Diving, Cross Country, Softball, Volleyball, Basketball, Baseball, Soccer, Tennis, Golf, Track, and Lacrosse. For questions about any of these sports, please contact the sponsor/coach.

In order to be able to participate in any of these sports, a student must have passed 5 out of 6 courses the previous semester AND the student must be "on track" for graduation. Each coach will discuss eligibility requirements with prospective players before each season's tryouts begin. If a student is deemed to be ineligible for any reason, he/she cannot attend tryouts or participate with that sport in any manner. If a student has to serve a suspension (out of school or in-school), he/she is not eligible to participate in practices or games until the day following the end of the suspension. For example, if a student serves ISS on a Friday, he/she cannot participate with the team until Monday.

Interscholastic athletics are an integral part of the educational curriculum and experience. High school athletics promote the character development of the participants, enhance the educational mission of schools, and promote civility in society. Therefore, student-athletes, coaches, spectators, and all others associated with high school activities programs should adhere to the fundamental values of respect, fairness, honesty, and responsibility. These values should be established as a priority among all GHSA member schools.

DRESS CODE FOR STUDENTS

A student shall not dress, wear or use emblems, insignias, oversized chains, badges or symbols, to include excessive or extreme hairstyles, hair colors, body piercings, or tattooing, which are likely to distract the attention of other students in the classroom, cause disruption or interference with the operation of the school, or violate health and safety standards of the school. No clothing shall be worn which is excessive or extreme in appearance, displays messages that are profane, vulgar, lewd, indecent or sexually suggestive, contains alcohol, tobacco or drug advertisements, or advocates criminal activity.

Students shall at all times abide by the following guidelines:

- Clothes and shoes that show good taste, avoiding extreme designs and styles which may pose a safety problem, are expected. Headdresses, hats, sweatbands and scarves, which are meant to be worn outside, are not to be worn inside the school building. Undergarments are not to be exposed.
- Shirts and Blouses – Unacceptable attire includes clothing that exposes the torso such as see-through garments, halters, spaghetti straps, backless dresses, tube tops, tank tops or muscle shirts, bare midriff outfits, or shirts or blouses that are tied at or may rise above the waist. Untucked t-shirts must be no longer than fingertip length.
